Well, that's exactly how I felt recently. And like always, there's a back story and it goes something like this.... well, No.... :-) it goes Exactly like this... Duh...

My entire life, I've been interested in cars and how they work and how much I enjoyed the freedom they gave a fella.

My first very own car was a 1964 Pontiac convertible GTO. It had a 389 C.I. with 348 H.P. And I was 16 years old and knew nothing about nothing. It was a perfect starting point for a kid who just wanted to go fast in a straight line. 3 years later I sold it and got a '69 Camaro. It had a 396 C.I. with 375 H.P. And man was she fast, 12.2 sec in the quarter mile and I knew every nut and bolt in her. Then life happens... you build a family, a career and a life far from all that and those interests get pushed to the back of your conscious Mind.

Time passes and old interests start migrating into my daydreams and I was lucky enough to find a 2000 Magnetic Red Corvette Roadster with a 5.7 L with 345 H.P. After a while I got to feel I knew her full potential. I was sure of what she was capable of and how she would respond when asked.

Now you know the back story for this article. Last September, with the help of a very special person, I found AWWWSUM. She's a 2016 DSOM Z06 convertible, with LT4 6.2L supercharged engine with 650 H.P. It's been 6 months and I still didn't feel like we've gotten to know one another. She's done everything I've ask, and better than I expected. But I just felt that she had so much more to share with me and it was my limitations as a driver, that was keeping those secrets locked up.

That's where club members, Darryl DelGuidice, John Mader and Rick Wasserback, come in. They were going to Thompson Speedway to track their cars and invited me. I originally was just going to go and watch and try to figure out what 'tracking a car" was all about. Now, don't get the wrong idea.... I'm NEVER going to be a 'Track Guy" but watching was never going to help me with **MY LIMITATIONS**...And So... here's a good place for another quote from that Dirty Harry movie. <u>"I GOTS TO KNOW"</u>. So, I sign up to go on the track and Thompson does it right.

Track opens at 7am. They have a driver's meeting at 8:30 to go over all the basics and emphasize safety. They offer 3 separate groups. Advanced, Intermediate and Novice. Each group gets 30-minute sessions on the track. This kinda knowledge goes a long way to level off any trepidation I was having and For obvious reasons, I chose Novice and asked for an instructor which was well worth it. As you drive along the instructor is telling you about the track and where and how to turn, which I found very beneficial. Darryl was on top of everything. He rented a garage bay space which we all used as home base, brought everything from tools to compressor to food and even a space heater, because the day started at 22 deg F. He introduced us to the organizers who made us all feel welcome.

SOOO, what did I learn on my first official track day?:

I learned how to find the apex of each turn and why it's important. I learned that I could really hit the brakes hard without causing the brakes to lock up. I learned that I should use the momentum of the corvette and not fight it. I learned that Traction Control REALLY works. Likewise for Stabilitrak.

I learned to use Touring mode on the street and Sport OR Track Mode on the track. And I came away with a few new "tools" that, God Willing, I may never need on the Street.

But the most important thing I learned was that we each have a starting point whenever we try something new and a venue like Thompson was THE best place to initiate that education. Lastly, Well-run tracks are filled with folks very similar to well-run car clubs. Their members are diverse, fun loving, experienced, who enjoy sharing their knowledge and all ya gotta do is smile and ask the question.




1990 Lionel Corvette Transport GP7 Train Set

Corvette enthusiasts know there is no shortage of products to which the sports car has lent its name. All kinds of toys, collectibles, and specialty items have used Corvettes as a theme, especially for products created by other iconic American brands. In 1999, for instance, toy designer Lionel partnered with General Motors to sell Corvette-themed train sets like this one. Donated to the National Corvette Museum by George Biederman, the set includes a locomotive, two flatbed cars, four die-cast Corvettes, and a caboose. This train is an O scale set, meaning the rolling stock is about 1:48 scale compared to a real train.

The set, called the Corvette Transport GP7, is a celebration of the Corvette's famous styling. The locomotive is red with a white cove and includes the Corvette crossed flags beneath the windows on the cab. Even the engine itself, the GP7, is a type of diesel-electric locomotive built from 1949 to 1954 by GM's Electro-Motive Division. The four die-cast Corvettes include a Polo White 1953 and Gypsy Red 1955, both from the first generation. Also along for the ride are a Torch Red 1997 and an Arctic White 1998 Corvette, representing the fifth-generation contemporary to the train set. The locomotive includes light and sound features, and the interior of the caboose even lights up as the train runs.

Although the Corvette has enjoyed a lengthy production run, Lionel's history of creating model trains is even longer. The present company traces its roots to 1900. By the 1920s, the original Lionel Corporation had become the American industry leader in producing toy trains. Lionel also encouraged department stores to make model trains part of their Christmas displays, which fostered the relationship between the holiday and train sets. Facing mounting financial difficulties by the late 1960s, the corporation began leasing the Lionel brand to another manufacturing company to produce the toy trains. The owner of the brand has changed several times since then, but the current version of Lionel continues to be a popular producer of model trains today.

The National Corvette Museum is licensed by the Kentucky Department of Charitable Gaming under license number ORG0000854.

Purchasers located in Kentucky can purchase raffle tickets on their personal computers, mobile devices and on-site at the National Corvette Museum and NCM Motorsports Park.

You must have access to a printer at the time that you create the order.
